
Ladies Groups

Welcome Deaconess Carole King Director of Parish Music

Deaconess Carole's father was a retired Lutheran principal, but her love of music comes from her mother who was a music teacher and organist. This led Deaconess Carole to enroll in the Bachelor of Music Education program at Concordia College, River Forest. She soon switched to the Deaconess program with a major in theology, a minor in church music, and a concentration in Greek, graduating in 1986.

Her deaconess internship was at St. Matthew's Lutheran Church in Esko, MN. Later, serving with Lutheran Bible Translators, she studied French in Brussels, Belgium and Neuchâtel, Switzerland and worked in francophone Cameroon, Africa, among the Gbaya-Mbodomo people.



Upon her return to the States in 1995, she taught in a small Christian school in Valparaiso, IN, before becoming an instructor and curriculum designer at a correspondence high school.

From 2017 to 2020, Deaconess Carole served in the Chaplaincy Department of Concordia Lutheran Ministries in greater Pittsburgh where she visited with residents and led Bible studies and hymn sings at many of Concordia's senior facilities.

Deaconess Carole was installed at St. Luke Lutheran Church, Clinton Township, MI on March 8, 2020. There she served as deaconess and music director. As music director, she planned music for worship including hymns, and choral and bell pieces. She played the organ and directed the choir and handbells.

Deaconess Carole taught confirmation and Sunday school, did shut-in visits, and was a member of St. Luke's Life Team. She also started a GriefShare group and a Trauma Reboot Recovery class.

A lover of the outdoors, Deaconess Carole has worked at four national parks and at a Lutheran camp. She also has adopted and fostered several basenji dogs.




Board of Missional Community

Sharing God's Bounty

Part of God's Plan

"In those days . . ." So begins a well-known passage of Scripture. Do you know what comes next? "In those days Caesar Augustus issued a decree . . ." (Luke 2:1). Some of us can quote the whole story by heart. Even though we've heard it year after year, some of us for many years, the story is still precious to hear, still warms our souls, still excites our minds, still calms our fears.

Two seemingly inconsequential people of little means obeyed that decree and traveled to the town of Bethlehem to register for the census. The woman, Mary, was about to have a child. She knew that her child was the Son of God, a child to be named Jesus. Joseph, her husband, knew he was not the father of the child, although that was how the world saw him. These were two of God's faithful. They knew the prophecies regarding the Messiah. They had been visited by the angel and learned that they were to be part of the fulfillment of those prophecies. They didn't know how things would turn out. They didn't know all that God had in store for them. They just "obey[ed their] rulers and submitted to their authority" (Hebrews 13:17) as they trusted God to guide and protect them and his Son each step they took on his path.

Of course, God did just that. God provided a place for the Child to be born (Luke 2:7). God sent angels to announce the birth of the King and moved the shepherds to respond to the joyful news and go to worship the new Baby (Luke 2:8-20). He sent "Magi from the East" who brought "gifts of gold and of incense and of myrrh" and then believed the warning God gave them in a dream and avoided the evil King Herod on their return trip (Matthew 2:1-12).

How many of these people involved in this most wondrous story realized the important and memorable parts they played? We cannot say for sure but surmise none could really comprehend the eternal significance of the events as they unfolded.

We, too, are involved in God's plans. Certainly none can equal in importance the birth of Christ, but nothing God does is without purpose. Are we listening for the voice of the Spirit as God speaks to us through God's Word? Are we, as we go about our daily routines, obeying our rulers, cognizant of being God's feet and hands and voice to carry out his plan? Do we bring our gifts, aware that God may use them according to a purpose we can't even imagine? How exciting it is to think and know that we are God's instruments! What a loss of blessing to us if we refuse to let God use us and another gets the opportunity instead (Esther 4:14)!

As we live out our daily lives as stewards, "let us fix our eyes on Jesus, the author and perfecter of our faith . . . so that we will not grow weary and lose heart" (Hebrews 12:2-3), but instead look forward with eagerness and anticipation toward the unfolding of God's plan in our lives.
