Christian Hope

This month I was blessed to be able to attend a conference called "Hope in a Secular Age." What a timely conference as for many people hope begins to dwindle. With the struggling economy, wars and rumors of war going around in the world, and the struggle of every day life it is easy to begin to lose hope. With the rise of anxiety and depression in record numbers one could argue that hope has indeed been lost. This is why it is so important for us Christians to hold fast to hope and proclaim it. However while at this conference I was reinforced with two central truths about hope that we must hold in tension; Christians do not have a monopoly on hope, and Christian hope is distinct and different from other hope.

Indeed everyone in this world hopes for something- for hope is the eager expectation for an as of yet unfulfilled desire. As I am writing this I am hoping the Cubs catch up to the Brewers. I have read that Aaron Rodgers hopes to recover from his Achilles tear in time for the playoffs. Donald Trump is hoping to get reelected as president. Kids are hoping for good grades. Parents are hoping for security and protection for their children. Some of these hopes are more certain than others- I am more certain in my hope to make it home safely tonight than Aaron Rodgers is about returning for a playoff run. There are hopes that we have that we doubt more than we are certain of. Some have hope that science can defeat death for example. I am filled with doubt. Some think that with Civil Rights movements we can create a peaceful and just world in this life. Again I am filled with doubt. We doubt because the object of our hope is less certain- there is less evidence for these things to fill me with certainty.

As Christians we sometimes tend to think we are the only ones who have a certain hope, that we have a monopoly on it. We laugh and scoff at the world's hopes, that there will be peace in our time, that a utopia can be created here on earth. Yet I do not know about you, but there are days where even my certain Christian hope is filled with doubt and uncertainty. There are days when I do doubt the forgiveness of my sins, when I wonder if Jesus is coming back. I do not hear Jesus speaking when I pray to him, and there are some days where he seems absent. Just like the hope of the world, the Christian hope is one that if we are honest, has moments of doubt. We cry out with a certain father "Lord I do believe, help my unbelief" (Mark 9:24). We do not have a monopoly on certain hope-because our hope is not certain since it is plagued by doubt.

And yet our hope is indeed a certain hope. It is certain because we know that it indeed will happen. We do not know it because we believe it, but it is certain because of the character and nature of the one who we hope in. This is what sets it distinct. When I begin to doubt whether or not I am forgiven- all I need to do is look to the cross to be reassured. When I wonder if he is present and listening, I only need to go back to his word and be reminded of his promises. When I wonder if he is coming back, I only need to see the prophecies he has already fulfilled. Indeed our Jesus keeps his promises- which is why we can hope in him. Our hope is not certain because of our inner strength of said hope- but it is certain because of the one who gives us hope.

Why does any of this matter? Well it allows us to be honest in our conversations with our friends and neighbors who have different hopes than we do. We can relate with the doubts, the fears and uncertainty that they have. We are not aloof or not understanding what they are going through. We are able to walk alongside them in their journey of doubt. But then we are also free to proclaim our hope, free to proclaim the one who solidifies our hope when we begin to doubt. A future utopia or the defeat of death through science cannot solidify hope the way that Jesus can. So we join our neighbor in their doubt and uncertainty, and proclaim Christ who makes certain that which is uncertain. He comes and helps us in our unbelief and fills us with hope. We proclaim his story, we proclaim his Gospel. This Gospel will fill us with hope, and we pray that it will also fill the hope of those whom we walk beside.



<u>Sharing God's Bounty</u>

Humble Stewards

As stewards, we are the recipients and caretakers of God's goodness, love, mercy, and grace. Stewards are managers of God's creation. We acknowledge God as the owner; therefore, we are to act not as owners but as managers because our lives and resources are simply on loan from him.

The book of Daniel gives an account of a man who failed to recognize God as Creator and provider and exalted himself. King Nebuchadnezzar, walking on the roof of "his" royal palace, surveying "his" kingdom, was overcome by pride as he announced, "*Is not this the great Babylon I have built as the royal residence, by my mighty power and for the glory of my majesty*" (Daniel 4:30)? He thought he was asking a rhetorical question, but God condemned him to live like an animal as a consequence of his pride.

Pride is destructive. It destroys gratitude to God for all his kindness to us. It destroys our desire and ability to serve others. It destroys contentment for it feeds our competitive nature so that we are not satisfied with just being wealthy or intelligent, but we want to be wealthier and more intelligent than anyone else.

Pride has no place in the life of a servant. First Peter 5:6 reads, "Humble yourselves, therefore, under God's mighty hand that he may lift you up in due time." It is God alone who can exalt us (Psalm 75:7). If Christ himself, God's only begotten Son, humbled himself, should we not follow his example and humble ourselves? Because Christ humbled himself, God exalted him (Philippians 2:9)

David, the shepherd-king, put our situation in proper perspective: "When I consider your heavens, the work of your fingers, the moon and the stars, which you have set in place, what is man that you are mindful of him, the son of man that you care for him" (Psalm 8:3-4)? The inference is that we are insignificant, yet David goes on to remind us of what we can be proud: "You made [us] ruler over the works of your hands; you put everything under [our] feet."

Humility allows us to accept our smallness and God's goodness. Humility is the decision to "let God be God." We are stewards through humility. We are to honor God with what we have, what we are, and what he will make of us.

Whatever standard we, choose, be it tithing or some other, it must never be confused with the reason for giving. We give because God has blessed us and because we want with all our hearts and minds to return to God that which God has given. This is the motive.
